Swayfield Parish Council Risk Assessment for Volunteer Litter Picking.

This form should be completed before the start of routine litter picking and reviewed periodically. The points below are largely common sense and litter picks are generally very safe. It is unlikely that any serious hazards or incidents will be encountered.

Swayfield is a rural village and the village streets and lanes around the village are generally very safe with low traffic volumes however each litter picker should be given a copy of this risk assessment and their attention should be drawn to the hazards and controls below.

Before starting litter picking volunteers should:

Ш	Have the correct Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) – eg Thick gloves, hi-viz vest, sensible footwear, weather appropriate
	clothing etc.

☐ Have the correct equipment – eg Litter grabbers, plastic bags, and know how to use the equipment.

Consider all the risks and hazards in the work area.

In the work area and how to report incidents or hazardous or unidentified waste, where to get first aid and where to deposit bags of waste in an appropriate bin.

The table below should be used to score the risks in the **Risk Assessment Table**.

On Completion of the Litter Pick Ensure:

Volunteers wash their hands thoroughly as soon as possible after the litter pick and before taking any food or drink.
All volunteers have reported back.
All rubbish collected has been disposed of in appropriate bins.
